





















Inside of PEP kids Koriyama, there were many people, from young to old, playing joyfully.

Following the Great East Japan Earthquake of March 11th, 2011, the importance of community solidarity was acclaimed; and, accordingly, the strong bonds that tie Japanese people together, their charitable attitude towards each other, was shown worldwide.

With time, however, the March 11th catastrophe and the damages that it inflicted on many children have rapidly receded from our memories.

Although the aftermath of the disaster has faded in our memories, those involved in the establishment and maintenance of PEP Kids Koriyama

continue to contribute to the joy of children in their play and to the maintenance of their mental health.

My mentor, Dr. Hisako Watanabe (Psychiatrist in the Department of Pediatrics at Keio University School of Medicine), provided us, survivors of the disaster, with encouraging words on March 21st, immediately after the incident.

With gratitude to Dr. Watanabe and others,

we believe that the tiny flicker of relief has coalesced into a bonfire of happiness for residents in Koriyama and Fukushima.

These days, there is greater concern about the changing environment of Japanese children.

There was once a feeling of solidarity, but this is also disappearing.

Yet, there has not been a full discussion of the range of problems as well as potential solutions to improve the environment.

The Great East Japan Earthquake of March 11th helped to publicize some of the problems in our environment in which children are being raised and growing up.

These problems have reached the threshold of media interest.

We, adults, should heed the call to reconsider our environment, and think about the best environment for raising children, so that they can live a healthy life. This will benefit not only children living in Fukushima but also those living throughout the country and world. We believe that facing the challenges in Fukushima will be the first step in developing a solution to the current set of problems.
